Spirit

SPIR'IT, n. [L. spiritus, from spiro, to breathe, to blow. The primary sense is to rush or drive.] 1. Primarily, wind; air in motion; hence, breath. Webster's 1828 Dictionary (1) The Human as Related with the Divine: We go a step higher when we find the human spirit brought into relationship with the Divine Spirit. For man is but a creature to whom life has been imparted by God's spirit - life being but a resultant of God's breath. Thus life and death are realistically described as an imparting or a withdrawing of God's breath, as in Job_27:3; Job_33:4; Job_34:14, "spirit and breath" going together. *International Standard Bible Encyclopedia*

Celestial

CELESTIAL, a. 1. Heavenly; belonging or relating to heaven; dwelling in heaven; as celestial spirits; celestial joys. Hence the word conveys the idea of superior excellence, delight, purity, &c. 2. Belonging to the upper regions, or visible heaven; as celestial signs; the celestial globe. 3. Descending from heaven; as a suit of celestial armor. CELESTIAL, n. An inhabitant of heaven.

Terrestrial

TERRES'TRIAL, a. [L. terrestris, from terra, the earth.] 1. Pertaining to the earth; existing on the earth; as terrestrial animals; bodies terrestrial. 1 Cor 15. 2. Consisting of earth; as the terrestrial globe. 3. Pertaining to the world, or to the present state; sublunary. Death puts an end to all terrestrial scenes. *Webster's 1828 Dictionary*

HELL, n. 1. The place or state of punishment for the wicked after death. 2. The place of the dead, or of souls after death; the lower regions, or the grave; called in Hebrew, sheol, and by the Greeks, hades. *Webster's 1828 Dictionary*
